

Epidemiological Update Cholera


Summary of the current situation¹

Haiti

Since the notification of the first two confirmed cases of *Vibrio cholerae* O1 in the greater Port-au-Prince area on 2 October 2022, to 24 February 2023, the Haitian Ministry of Health (Ministère de la Santé Publique et de la Population, MSPP per its French acronym)², reported a total of 33,185 suspected cases (**Figure 1**) in 10 departments of the country, including 2,398 confirmed cases, 29,288 hospitalized suspected cases, and 594 registered deaths³. This represents an increase in the last 7 days of 5% in suspected cases (N=1,432), 3% in confirmed cases (N=80) and 0% in deaths (N=0). As of 24 February 2023, all 10 departments have confirmed cases. To date, the case fatality rate among suspected cases is 1.8% (institutional fatality rate is 1.3%).

Of a total of 6,452 samples analyzed by the National Public Health Laboratory (LNSP for its acronym in French), 2,398 were confirmed (37.2% positivity rate).

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


Figure 2. Distribution of suspected cases of cholera by age group in Haiti from 29 September 2022 to 24 February 2023

Of the total reported suspected cases with available information, 56% are male and 51% are aged 19 years or younger. The most affected age group is 1 to 4-year-olds (21%), followed by 5 to 9-year-olds (15%) and 20 to 29-year-olds (14%) (**Figure 2**).

Among confirmed cases, 57% are male, and 50% are aged 19 years or younger. The most affected age group is 1 to 4-year-olds (20% of total), followed by 5 to 9-year-olds (16%) and 20 to 29-year-olds (14%) (**Figure 3**).

The Ouest Department continues to report the highest number of cases, with 54% of all suspected cases recorded. The municipalities of Port-au-Prince, Cité-Soleil and Carrefour account for 62% (N=11,088) of all suspected cases reported in the Ouest Department. In the

last 7 days, the department of Ouest reported a 2% increase in suspected cases and a 2% increase in confirmed cases. For the same period, the other departments reported an increase of 7% in suspected cases and 6% in confirmed cases.





Figure 4. New suspected cholera cases in Haiti reported in last epidemiological week

The municipalities that reported the most increase in suspected cases in EW 8 of 2023 compared to EW 7 were Hinche (86), Cerca La Source (45), Savanette (34) and Mirebalais (28) in Centre department; Saint-Michel de l'Attalaye (53), Gonaives (32) and Saint-Marc (26) in Artibonite department; Miragoane (53) and Anse-a-Veau (40) in Nippes department; Cabaret (52), Croix-Des-Bouquets (42), Delmas (34), Tabarre (31), Grand-Goave (27) and Carrefour (26) in Ouest department; Cap-Haitien (42) in Nord department; and Saint-Louis du Nord (29 cases) in Nord-Ouest department (**Figure 4**).

The municipalities that proportionally increased the notification of suspected cases in EW 8 of 2023 compared to EW 7 were Grand-Goave (79%) in Ouest department; and Savanette (57%) in Centre department (**Figure 5**).

The current conditions in Haiti must be considered when analyzing the epidemiological situation of this cholera outbreak using the available official data. Epidemiological surveillance is affected due to the complex humanitarian and security crisis, added to the limited access to fuel throughout the country, resulting in limited access to health services and laboratories. Moreover, most of the population in the country is in a highly vulnerable situation in the face of established cholera transmission chains in the departments and municipalities. In addition, this vulnerability is also related to the limited conditions of generalized access to drinking water, sanitation, and hygiene. The humanitarian crisis and insecurity have exacerbated in recent months. This has considerably undermined the efforts of the MSPP and other organizations to implement prevention and control measures, including epidemiological surveillance, leading to underreporting of cases.

The Pan American Health Organization / World Health Organization (PAHO / WHO) is working in coordination with the Haitian public health authorities to characterize this event and support the response.

Dominican Republic

On 22 February 2023, the Dominican Republic Ministry of Public Health confirmed five additional cases of cholera in the country corresponding to three females aged 46, 26, and 23 years old, and two males aged 60 and 8 years old, residents of Villas Agrícolas, Los Coquitos and Las Lagunas sectors in the Santo Domingo metropolitan area. Since the notification of the first confirmed case on 20 October 2022, to 22 February 2023, a total of 82

confirmed cases have been reported in the Dominican Republic, of which 76% (n= 66) are residents of the Santo Domingo metropolitan area. The Ministry's press release is available in Spanish at: https://bit.ly/3IBWoj2.

Guidance for national authorities

The Pan American Health Organization / World Health Organization (PAHO/WHO) recommends that Member States continue their efforts to strengthen and maintain cholera surveillance in order to detect suspected cases early, provide adequate treatment and prevent its spread. Early and adequate treatment maintains the case-fatality rate (CFR) of hospitalized patients at less than 1%.

PAHO/WHO encourages Member States to simultaneously continue their efforts to guarantee adequate basic sanitation conditions and access to drinking water, in addition to hygiene promotion and social mobilization, to reduce the impact of cholera and other waterborne diseases.
