^kIn the previous Zika update from the Belize Ministry of Health on 18 January 2017, a total of 816 suspected and 73 confirmed cases were notified to PAHO/WHO (EW 2 of 2016 to EW 52 of 2016). On 8 May 2017, the Belize Ministry Health notified PAHO/WHO of 1,294 suspected cases and 206 confirmed cases distributed between epidemiological week (EW) 2 of 2016 and 18 of 2017, of which 472 suspected cases and 124 confirmed cases correspond to new cases notified between EW 1 and 18 of 2017.
