



Access to water and sanitation in La Hispaniola



Infrastructure alone is not enough to solve the problem.



What has been done, and needs to continue

Strategies for cholera control and elimination:

- Sectoral coordination
- Improvement of water supply systems
- Household water treatment and storage
- WASH in schools and health centres
- Hygiene education and health promotion
- Sanitation / Elimination of open defecation
- Community mobilization and mass communication



Beyond the WASH sector: **Inter-sectoral coordination** and joint efforts with Health, Education...

CALL TO ACTION

Investing in infrastructure is a must, BUT...

- it will take considerable time to attain adequate coverage.
- it has to be complemented by appropriate behaviour change to achieve maximum benefits.
