ADePT-Health is a menu-driven stand-alone computer program that implements most of the methods that are widely used in empirical studies of health equity and that are summarized in: O'Donnell, O., E. van Doorslaer, A. Wagstaff and M. Lindelow "Analyzing Health Equity Using Household Survey Data: A Guide to Techniques and Their Implementation" (Washington DC, World Bank, 2008). ADePT-Health simplifies the production of tables and charts that are common in the literature, and helps ensure that tables and charts are comparable across countries and over time.
