

- (1) Antigua and Barbuda administered a combined total of 275 doses of Td, MMR, hepatitis B, polio and influenza vaccines.
- (2) Barbados vaccinated construction and agricultural workers with the Td vaccine and students in tertiary institutions with the varicella vaccine.
- (3) High risk occupations include health workers and poultry farmers vaccinated for influenza. Others include individuals with chronic disease and pregnant women (as of the second trimester) vaccinated for influenza and pneumoccocal vaccination in adults aged ≥65 years.
- (4) Individuals between 15-59 years of age vaccinated with tetanus toxoid.
- (5) Preliminary data.
- (6) MR/MMR data is for the month of April.
- (7) Guatemala's campaign ran from 1 April to 16 June 2008 and the country administered the MMR vaccine to children aged 1-7 years and oral polio vaccine to children aged < 4 years.
- (8) Guyana vaccinated populations in six of its 10 Regions across a wide spectrum of ages and using multiple antigens.
- (9) Preliminary data.
- (10) Groups vaccinated were aged 0-4 years and 4-17 years.


