This situation update is on the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) reported cases and deaths, Globally, Regionally, for Barbados and Eastern Caribbean Countries, French Territories and the United Kingdom Overseas Territories.

WHO Director-General's opening remarks at the media briefing on COVID-19 - 10 July 2020



Today, WHO is launching the Access Initiative for Quitting Tobacco, which aims to help the world's 1.3 billion tobacco users quit during the pandemic.

This initiative will help people freely access the resources they need to quit tobacco, like nicotine replacement therapy and access to a digital health worker for advice.

Smoking kills eight million people a year, but if users need more motivation to kick the habit, the pandemic provides the right incentive. Evidence reveals that smokers are more vulnerable than non-smokers to developing a severe case of COVID-19.

The project is led by WHO, together with the UN Interagency Task Force on Non-communicable Diseases and brings together tech industry, pharmaceutical, and NGO partners like PATH and the Coalition for Access to NCD Medicines and Products.

We thank our first manufacturing partners Johnson & Johnson Consumer Health, who donated nearly 40,000 nicotine patches.


We are also pleased to introduce Florence, the world and WHO's first-ever digital health worker, based on artificial intelligence.


COVID-19 case update:

In the Region of the Americas, an additional **132,520** cases and **3,487** deaths were reported in the past 24 hours, representing a 2.12% relative increase in cases and a 1.26% relative increase in deaths, compared to the previous day.

On 9th July Montserrat recorded one case after 87 days of no new cases; Saint Kitts and Nevis as well Antigua and Barbuda each reported new cases on 10 July 2020.






Resuming International Travel in the Caribbean

This webinar is for the health, tourism, immigration, and other relevant sectors for sharing experiences and providing technical guidance.

The expected outcome - Build common understanding on decision-making process for resuming non-essential travel during COVID-19.

SAVE THE DATE: 17 July 2020, 11:00am

Resuming incoming non-essential international travel is not exempt from the risk of importation of SARS-CoV-2 virus, and the decision to do so should be gradual and will be dynamic in terms of adjusting restrictions.

The key factors that should inform the reiterative risk assessment process, underpinning the dynamic decision-making process related to the resuming or restricting non-essential international travel are the:

- i. public health and health services capacity in destination countries and territories;
- ii. analysis of the probability of importation of SARS-CoV-2 virus based on the COVID-19 epidemiological situation at the origin of the voyage of the conveyance and/or traveler (e.g., countries ore territories experiencing community transmission are associated with a greater risk of importation of SARS-COV-2 virus);
- iii. communication capacity in countries and territories.
