
CENTRAL AMERICA AND THE CARIBBEAN | Call for applications complete and projects to be unveiled soon



The Social Innovation in Health Central America and the Caribbean Call for Solutions closed on August 21st 2017. As part of a global collaboration of partners passionate about advancing community-based solutions in healthcare, the Pan American Health Organization PAHO/WHO has been working with the Social Innovation in Health Initiative (SIHI) and several other institutions across the Americas to identify social innovations in health that provide successfully implemented solutions for infectious diseases across the Central America and Caribbean region (learn more about the collaboration and the different partners here). The selected high-impact solutions that tackle health care delivery issues in Central America and the Caribbean will be announced by the end of September and due-diligence visits will be conducted to develop case studies. Health in the Americas+ 2017—the Pan American Health Organization's flagship publication—reports on health



developments and drivers in the Region of the Americas since the 2012 edition. This new edition features profiles of the health status of each of the Region's countries and territories based on the latest available data. The publication offers a summary of achievements and challenges, which are detailed in full in the interactive online platform. The *Health in the Americas+ 2017* package provides a comprehensive picture of health region wide, covering topics such as universal health, major obstacles and advances in the past 5 years, and the Regional outlook looking

forward. A new chapter is devoted to this prospective view, and highlights current trends as harbingers of potential issues that may lie ahead. As a common regional health agenda is forged, aligned with, and bolstered by the 2030 global UN agenda (i.e. Sustainable Development Goals, such a forward-looking perspective will be increasingly important.

RESEARCH POLICY IMPLEMENTATION

IN THE REGION

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COLOMBIA | Network of the Latin American Center for Regional Training (LAC-RTC), CIDEIM



On August 3-4 TDR, the Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases convened a meeting at CIDEIM, the regional TDR training center for Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC-RTC). This meeting was supported by the World Health Organization's Program for Training and Research in Tropical Diseases (WHO-TDR) and convened "champions" from partner institutions in the Regional Training Centre network. Leaders representing 9 academic institutions in 6 countries in Latin America and the Caribbean worked under the lead of TDR's Director Dr. John Reeder, and TDR's Manager of Capacity Building

in Research and Knowledge Management, Dr. Pascal Launois. The meeting had three objectives: 1) to review LAC-

RTC activities and share lessons learned; 2) develop the 2018-2019 work plan, including institutional training programs and goals for disseminating implementation research capacity and good health research practices in the region; and 3) define the roles of the different institutions that make up the LAC-RTC network and design a framework for inter-institutional collaboration. Participants shared experiences and perspectives and committed to joint work to create a community of practice that strengthens research capacities in the region. The leaders represented the following institutions from the LAC-RTC Network: National Autonomous University of Honduras; Greater University of San Andrés, Bolivia; Pontificia Universidad Católica de Ecuador; Universidad del Valle, Guatemala; University of the West Indies, Jamaica; Universidad del Valle, Colombia; Universidad de los Andes, Colombia; University of Antioquia, Colombia; and CIDEIM, Colombia.

Guyana| **Planning for success - training research teams on Effective Project Planning and Evaluation**



Eleven teams with 35 professionals from Guyana attended the first <u>Planning for success: effective project planning and evaluation of health research (EPPE)</u> workshop in Guyana. The activity was coordinated by PAHO's country office in Guyana and the Department of Knowledge Management, Bioethics and Research with

support from the EPPE Training Center at the University of the West Indies and CIDEIM, a WHO Collaborating Center and TDR Regional Training Center. The EPPE training is a train-the-trainers scheme that enables research teams to be more competitive delivering quality research. In our <u>second quarter 2017 newsletter</u> we reported on the training of trainers project from Suriname in May 2017. Some of the trainers from this workshop are joining the TDR/CIDEIM and UWI trainers in Guyana to disseminate best practices and expand the regional capacities for training. The network of trainers from this TDR/CIDEIM/PAHO initiative established in 2007 (with training centers in University of the West Indies-Jamaica, Universidad Autónoma de Honduras, CIDEIM-Colombia, and Fiocruz-Brazil) has trained >400 experts in the Caribbean in these hands-on workshops. Each workshop involves collaboration with the teams before and after the event, as well as evaluations to ensure ongoing quality improvement. The event is also a testament to the leadership of PAHO/WHO Representative, Dr. Willian Adu-Krow, who is determined to ensure that Guyana seizes the benefits of research for health.

ARGENTINA | Ministry of Health publishes its Sept 2017 Health Research Bulletin



The Ministry of Health in Argentina released the September health research bulletin with information from a trimester of activities to advance research for health policies in Argentina. This release includes a new scholarship announcement the *Dr. Abraam Sonis 2018 Scholarships for Health Research*. These

scholarships are for professionals working in non-profit institutions: hospitals and primary health care centers, universities, public and private sector, etc. Applicants should apply by **21 November 2017**. The bulletin includes news on **the Deas-Project Tutors program**, a strategy aimed at strengthening research capacities in Public and Clinical Health areas. BRAZIL | PAHO / WHO, Brazilian institutions and Harvard University come together to discuss SUS



The PAHO/WHO Brazil office partnered with Harvard University to assess 30 years of the Brazilian Unified Health System (SUS) and identify solutions and policies for the Brazilian health system up to 2030. This time frame was chosen because it coincides with the deadline for the **United Nations Sustainable Development Goals** (a.k.a. 2030 Agenda). The assessments will gather evidence to inform critical decisions in overcoming the challenges posed to the Brazilian system. The study is expected to provide a summary of the effects of the SUS in the past three decades, and provide suggestions to improve the quality of public health in the specific

political and economic context of Brazil. The Sustainable Development Goals for 2030 highlight the relevance of this study to other countries who may see Brazil as a case study for effective health policies. Read more by clicking here.

BRAZIL | WHO Collaborating Center for Rehabilitation

A recently appointed WHO Collaborating Centre, the WHO Collaborating Centre for Rehabilitation at the Institute



of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation at the University of Sao Paulo (IMREA-HCMUSP), will host a two day meeting on 8-9 November, in Brazil. This meeting will focus on rehabilitation data and research, and will convene leading regional actors in rehabilitation research to discuss ways of improving the availability of field-specific evidence and research. This meeting follows a two-day regional leadership summit on Rehabilitation

2030, a meeting to address the action points raised at <u>Rehabilitation 2030: A call for action</u> and strengthen leadership to improve rehabilitation services within health systems. Guyana | Strengthening Health Research Capacities



From August 28 to September 1st 2017, Dr. Luis Alejandro Salicrup, Officer in Detail with PAHO-KBR traveled with a two experts from Florida International University to Guyana to implement capacity building efforts geard towards strengthening health research governance in the country. They delivered the course "Introduction to Clinical and Epidemiological Research Methods" under the lead of Dr. Juan Manuel Lozano and Dr. Marcia Varella. This course aimed to advance knowledge on clinical and

epidemiological research among country officers. Dr. Salicrup also met with Guyana's PAHO representative Dr. Adu-Krow and Ministry of Health representatives and technical officers, to discuss next steps in strenghening the country's health research capacities and advancing the PAHO Policy on Research for Health within the Country. 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COLOMBIA | GRADE symposium in Colombia and delivery of GRADE tools in Spanish

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The Department of Clinical Epidemiology and Biostatistics of the Pontificia Universidad Javeriana, partnered with the Department of Health Research Methods, Evidence and Impact (HEI) of McMaster University, to deliver new Spanish-language tools for the development of health-specific knowledge translation strategies, supported by the GRADE approach. Led by Dr. María Ximena Rojas-Reyes, the joint project resulted in trained users, and delivery of both the GRADE Manual in Spanish and the Guideline Development Tool (GDT) for the development of Clinical Practice Guidelines (CPG). The CPG includes the "From Evidence to Recommendations" (EtD) format, which promotes strategies to support decision-making in health such as the collection of relevant information for the development of CPGs and technology assessments. The results delivery symposium was held at

the Pontificia Universidad Javeriana in Bogota, where conference, training workshops, and the GRADE Working Group occurred as well. These free access tools are available at this **link**.

HONDURAS | Research Ethics in Pregnant Women: Subregional Forum Developed In Tegucigalpa, August 2017



From August 22 and 23, 2017, the XIII Central American and Caribbean Congress of Parasitology and Tropical Medicine held the Forum on Research in Pregnant women in Tegucigalpa, Honduras. The objective of the Forum was to review and discuss the ethical aspects of conducting research in pregnant women to promote their responsible inclusion in scientific research. Facilitators, teachers, and researchers from renowned Latin American institutions participated, including Naval Medical Research Unit (NAMRU-6), Peru; the National Center for Maternal and Child Health Research, Dr. Hugo Mendoza (CENISMI), Dominican Republic; Department

of Knowledge Management, Bioethics and Research, PAHO / WHO, Washington DC; and Faculty of Medical Sciences, National Autonomous University of Honduras. In addition, representatives of six Central American and Caribbean countries presented an ethics-focused regulatory framework for studies involving pregnant women between 2015 – 2017. The Forum received a Meeting Fellowship Grant (reference 206541 / Z / 17 / Z) from the Global Forum on Bioethics in Research (GFBR)/Wellcome Trust in conjunction with the Institute of Infectious Diseases and Parasitology Antonio Vidal.

ARGENTINA | Technical cooperation research in maternal, child and/or adolescent health, Current and upcoming studies Year 2017

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PAHO Argentina has provided technical support in promoting research in maternal, child, and adolescent health. The results included 76,483 subdermal contraceptive implants placed by the National Program on Sexual Health and Responsible Procreation (PNSSyPR). This group is also conducting a descriptive study of users of subdermal implants to learn about the acceptability of implants, as well as the degree of satisfaction with implant use. As part of health management and monitoring, The Maternity, Infancy and Adolescence Department of the Ministry of Health of the Nation launched the National Breastfeeding Survey to

evaluate the prevalence of breastfeeding at 6 months and 15 months of the child's life. In similar efforts, The Maternity and Childhood Department of the Autonomous City of Buenos Aires (CABA) intends to administer a study on the characterization of infant mortality, including the relative role of maternal and neonatal factors, as well as that of logistical factors such as transportation and healthcare availability. Additionally, The National Program of Integral Health of Adolescents (PNSIA) conducted a study titled "Approach to mitigate the external causes of adolescent morbimortality". It aims to reduce adolescent morbidity and mortality due to external causes (suicide, homicide and road accidents), and includes management, training, research, interdisciplinary and intersectoral coordination, and technical assistance for provincial programs throughout the country. As part of its participation in the WHO's multinational projects, Argentina was selected to participate in research such as the WHO Multi-country survey on abortion (WHOMCS-A) analyzing abortion-related morbidity in the country's medical facilities; and the Global Maternal Sepsis Study. BRAZIL | Evidence-Informed Policy Network - EVIPNet



The Evidence-informed Policy
Network in Brazil (EVIPNet
Brasil) is a PAHO/WHOsupported Brazilian initiative
coordinated by the Ministry
of Health's Department of
Science and Technology. The
Network promotes the integration of
scientific evidence in the development and
implementation of health policies. Two EVIPNet Brazil Public
Calls (in 2014 and 2017) were launched to select proposals for
financing projects aimed at strengthening the Unified Health

System. As an outcome of the 2014 call, the Ministry of Health of Brazil published the Volume I synthesis of *Evidence for Health Policies*, a collection of 11 books that is geared towards health managers, and addresses issues relevant to clinical practice, management of health services and systems, and the development of public policies. ARGENTINA | Research to reduce harmful impacts of alcohol consumption



Per-capita alcohol consumption in Argentina is among the highest in Latin America. Worldwide, alcohol has been associated with nearly 6% of deaths and 5% of the burden of disease, with a loss of about 139 Million Disability Adjusted Life-Years. The Argentina PAHO/WHO country office invites you to read information about a multi-faceted study to promote public policies that reduce the harmful impacts of alcohol consumption and abuse. The study analyzes market factors and advertising information, as well as evaluates

BRAZIL | ABRASCO's APS Network and PAHO/WHO are delineating an impact study of the Mais Medicos Program on public health.



The Research Network on Primary Health Care (APS Network) of the Brazilian Association of Collective Health (ABRASCO) and the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO) established a joint project to evaluate the impact of the Program Mais Medicos Brazil (PMMB) in public health. The evaluation included workshops with leading researchers and experts in impact assessment to discuss the theoretical and methodological obstacles in the current debate on impact assessments of social interventions. A publication about the challenges of assessing the impact of public policies such as the Mais Medicos Program will follow. Link.

BRAZIL | Health professions, professional territories, territorial disputes and conflicting arenas: A comparative study of Brazil among selected countries.



To ensure a skilled, well distributed and appropriately resourced workforce the Ministry of Health of Brazil is working to develop policies in human resources that address health and ensure public access to qualified human resources. The Ministry of Health, in partnership with PAHO/WHO Brazil, promotes research to better understand the healthcare sector and its associated challenges. This is achieved through the network ObservRH, a

body that analyzes human resources in the health sector, and the Nucleus of Studies and Research in Human Resources in Health(NERHUS, Núcleo de Estudos e Pesquisas em Recursos Humanos em Saúde). This will help analyze the regulatory processes of health professions, and focuses on professional jurisdictions, shared fields of professional practice, and the conflicts and territorial disputes resolved within councils, professional associations, and unions. This project will provide a comparative analysis between the health professions in Brazil and those in Thailand, Costa Rica, Mexico, Mozambique, Canada, and Portugal. Link.

TECHNICAL COOPERATION | PAHO and Guyana Ministry of Health cooperate on national health research agenda update



The Office Knowledge management, Bioethics, and Research (KBR) and PWR Guyana organized a technical visit for Dr. Bendita Lachmansingh, from the Ministry of Health Guyana, to PAHO-HQ from 5–15 September 2017. The purpose is for her to gain knowledge about technical cooperation opportunities, and lay the foundation for Guyana to update its National Health Research Agenda and develop its Policy on Research for Health.

2017 5th Annual Meeting, International Confederation of ATOD Research Associations – ICARA



The 2017 International Confederation of Addiction Research Associations (ICARA) had its annual meeting at PAHO/WHO Headquarters on 28-30 August. Participants discussed, among other things, how to build on existing resources to enhance translation and implementation of research findings into policies and tangible changes in society. The agenda for the meeting can be downloaded from this link. The meeting organizers included the President of ICARA Dr. Thomas Babor, and Dr. Maristela Monteiro from PAHO. As an umbrella organization for research societies across the globe focusing on

alcohol, other drugs and addictive behaviors, ICARA brings together various research societies to promote complementary national and international research through professional exchange, collaboration and action. The 5th meeting of ICARA focused on building capacities for research related to alcohol, tobacco and other drugs, with a special focus on the Americas. The meeting was an opportunity to identify future collaborations and funding opportunities to strengthen research infrastructure in the Americas by linking ICARA efforts to other PAHO/WHO capacity development efforts and policies.

RESEARCH INTEREST GROUP | Photonovelas and Research Communication Methods to Reduce Health and Education Disparities for Low-Literacy, Dr. Sylvia Martinez



On July 18th, Dr. Silvia Martinez delivered a presentation on "Photonovelas (Latin American soap operas) and Research Communication Methods to Reduce Health and Education Disparities for Low-Literacy", at PAHO HQ Dr. Martinez is a bilingual speech and language pathologist, professor and researcher at Howard University, who has encouraged the use of illustrated stories to communicate and educate immigrant populations with low literacy levels on health prevention strategies. She analyses the use and impact of these "Photonovelas (photo illustrated-soaps)" on improved

understanding about prevention and control of illnesses, including both infectious and non-communicable diseases, and their associated risk factors. Photonovelas are also instrumental in empowering vulnerable communities to take charge of their health education and develop independence in their health decision-making. CIDEIM & University of Honduras | Course to Promote Good Health Research Practices in the Region





The International Center for Training and Medical Research, (CIDEIM), Regional Training Center (RTC) of Latin America and the Caribbean, partnered with the Scientific Research Unit of the Faculty of Medical Sciences of the National Autonomous University of Honduras (UNAH), to host the course "Good Health

Research Practices" (BPIS) in Cali, Colombia, from July 31 to August 3, 2017. This course, supported by the Program for Training and Research in Tropical Diseases of the World Health Organization, is based on the premise that quality and ethics must be integrated in all areas of research that involves people. Although Good Clinical Practices (PCBs) are available for clinical trials, it has been difficult for non-clinical research to adapt these requirements. Therefore, the BPIS course is intended to ensure that health research of all kinds is held to the highest standard, i.e. that which regulars clinical trials. The course was 3.5 days long, and participants were leaders of institutions in the TDR initiative who were motivated to decentralize the regulation and capacity building of health research. The participating institutions and countries were Greater University of San Andrés, Bolivia; Pontificia Universidad Católica de Ecuador; University of the Valley of Guatemala; University of Valle, Cali, Colombia; Universidad de los Andes, Bogotá, Colombia; and the University of Antioquia, Medellín, Colombia;

RIMAIS & PAHO | Training course: Innovation in health oriented to social needs



Between October 16th and 18th, 2017, the Technical Secretary of the RIMAIS and its Technical Advisory Council, with support from INTERCOONECTA Program of the Spanish Agency for International Development Cooperation, will host a training course titled, "Innovation in health oriented to social needs". The course will take place in Santa Cruz de la Sierra, Bolivia and will be facilitated by Dr. Janis Lazdins with support from the Fundación Mundo Sano, the Spanish Medicines Agency, LAC countries, and PAHO/WHO. The conference aims to prepare officials from Ibero-American

health ministries with knowledge and skills on concepts of health innovation cycles, and enhance their ability to complete a survey prepared by the RIMAIS Secretariat on WHO's Evaluation of The Global Strategy and Plan of Action on Public Health, Innovation and Intellectual Property. The course has 8 components that cover a wide breadths of topics such as research and development; construction and improvement of the capacity of innovation for health; manufacturing health products; strategies for improving the distribution and access to health products; promoting sustainable financing mechanisms; and monitoring and evaluation. Dr. Luis Alejandro Salicrup, Senior International Advisor at the US National Cancer Institute currently on Detail at PAHO's Office of Knowledge Management, Bioethics and Research, will travel to Bolivia to attend the course and support the building of regional implementation capacities for the PAHO Policy on Research for Health.

CITI Course | PAHO partners with University of Miami to develop new course on producing quality research



One of the outcomes of the PAHO-EQUATOR Network partnership has been the development of a 4 module course "to enhance the value and use of reserch" that will first be offered to PAHO-OAS Scholars through the Collaborative Institutional Training Initiative (CITI Program). PAHO thanks the CITI Program and most specially Paul Braunschweiger, Pablo Vasconcelos, Viviane Francis, and their team, as well as the coordination provided by Dr. Sergio Litewka, international director of the Institute of

Bioethics at the University of Miami, and Dr. Kenneth Goodman, Director of the WHO Collaborating Center on Health and Ethical Policies at the Institute of Bioethics, who facilitated the incorporation of this course into the CITI Program platform. PAHO and EQUATOR Network are assessing options to expand access to this course to a broader audience and in other languages. The four modules of the course include (1) Importance of good research reporting: be ethical, be thorough, and make your editor happy; (2) Road map to reporting guidelines: how to find them and use them; (3) Writing for publication: using reporting guidelines to write up your study; (4) Linking research planning, knowledge translation and policies.

PAST CONFERENCES

Spain | EU-LAC Health Conference and Joint Initiative on Health Research



In June 2017 PAHO-KBR's Senior Advisor for Research Promotion and Development attended the EU-LAC Health Final Conference and Joint Initiative on Health Research and Innovation (JIRI-Health), in Madrid. The EULAC Health 5 year project was sponsored by the European Union to establish effective multi-sectoral partnerships between the EU, and Latin-America and

Caribbean countries. A policy-oriented roadmap was set which took into account both the EU political framework for science and technology and PAHO policies on priority areas in advancing research & innovation in cooperation between these regions. The meeting summary highlights the participation of prominent institutions at the event. The 3 main goals were: 1) Discuss and explore with policy makers best practices to coordinate health research policies and funding between EU and LAC; 2) Establish a consensus roadmap for cooperative health research and set a future collaborative framework between the EU and LAC regions; and 3) Disseminate the project results to primary stakeholders to increase and improve EU-LAC cooperation in health research. The recommendations included following-up on progress with JIRI-Health and other partners from the conference. In the EU-LAC Health Joint Call, 21 funding agencies from 19 different countries participated. Out of 46 proposals, 38 were eligible with 14 focusing on neurodegenerative disorders and 24 on infectious diseases. These involved 176 research groups and amounted to approximately 16.3 Million Euros; the funding commitment was 6.68 Million Euros. To learn more about the conference click this link.

WHO/Cochrane/Cornell | Summer Institute for Systematic Reviews in Nutrition for Global Policy Making



WHO/COCHRANE/CORNELL UNIVERSITY SUMMER INSTITUTE FOR SYSTEMATIC REVIEWS IN NUTRITION FOR GLOBAL POLICY MAKING

JULY 24-AUGUST 4, 2017

Cornell University's Division of Nutrition hosted the 4th annual WHO/Cochrane/Cornell University Summer Institute for Systematic Reviews in Nutrition for Global Policy Making in New York from July 24th to August 4th. The two-

week conference is a collaboration between WHO, Cochrane, and Cornell University to develop and enhance technical skills in systematic reviews of nutrition-related interventions and build understanding of global policy making, nutrition, evidence assessment and the challenges that may accompany these efforts. Around 40 experts, researchers, and professionals from around the world gathered to participate in the summer institute. The conference provided opportunities to develop skills and knowledge by working on systematic reviews, and built

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towards a broader goal of providing evidence on important questions regarding the role of nutrition in health. Knowledge gained from the conference will also be used to develop new WHO guidelines on nutrition. Overall, the conference aims to advance evidence-based policies to address the world's most important global health problems and reinforces WHO's role in systematically promoting evidence-based policy development to member states. Colombia | XVI Annual Meeting of the Ibero-American Cochrane Network



The <u>Ibero-American Cochrane Network</u> held its <u>annual meeting in Medellín on 5-7 June 2017</u>. The meeting was hosted by the Universidad de Antioquia and organized by Dr. Hector Ivan García and Dr. Xavier Bonfill. Notable guests included Cochrane's <u>Deputy Editor-in-Chief Dr. Karla Soares-Weise, Clinical Editor Sera Tort</u> and author representative at the Cochrane Council, Dr. <u>Maria Ximena Rojas Reyes</u>.

Cochrane Colombia organized a symposium with 8 collaborating or affiliated centers and the presentations included an historical account of how Cochrane began in Colombia as outlined by PAHO's Senior Advisor for Research Promotion and Development. PAHO was represented at the event by PAHO's Advisor for Health Research Management, Dr. Ludovic Reveiz.

CARPHA | Strengthening Household and community Actions for the Prevention and Control of Arboviral Diseases in the Caribbean



The Caribbean Public Health Agency completed its third stakeholder dialogue on 26 April 2016, in Port of Spain, Trinidad and Tobago. With the support of PAHO/WHO, 18 participants with backgrounds in research, insect vector control, health promotion; environmental health, social marketing, information technology; and behavioural sciences were convened to discuss strategies for strengthening household and community action for the prevention and control of arboviral diseases. The discussions were informed by an evidence brief, which synthesized the available international and Caribbean research evidence on the topic. Fourteen recommendations for accelerated implementation were prioritized by the stakeholders, based on the presented research.

PAJPH| New open Access Policy & Application calls for papers on Men's Health





Global Evidence Summit 2017


