Collective strength: Established regional networks and mechanisms, including the Regional Revolving Funds of the Pan American Health Organization, the Pan Caribbean Partnership Against HIV and AIDS, and other collaborative platforms, alongside an organized and engaged civil society.

Three pillars to reach elimination

Detect early

Timely and expanded diagnosis

- Rapid testing and self-testing
- Earlier diagnosis
- Services close to communities

Prevent more

Expansion of :

- Oral PrEP
- Long-acting PrEP

Regional models suggest that this combined strategy could reduce new infections by more than 70% by 2030.

Treat better

Optimized treatment and integrated care

- Immediate initiation of antiretroviral therapy
- Sustained viral suppression

This reduces transmission and healthcare costs, and helps improve quality of life.



Access for all

The elimination of HIV requires addressing the structural conditions that drive its transmission and mortality, reducing stigma and discrimination, and ensuring access to quality services for all.

Alliance contributions

- Multisectoral regional coordination
- Aligning of individual efforts toward a common goal
- Capacity to mobilize resources
- Promotion of access to innovation
- Establishment of a formal process to recognize progress toward HIV elimination (**Path to Elimination**)
